

FINAL 2009 Region 7 Substance Abuse Prevention Plan Survey

The SFY 2009 Regional Prevention Plans is based on a new format but still establishes priority target populations, risk and protective factors and service types for substance abuse prevention funding. The new template simplifies the process, better aligns prevention planning with DHW and SAMHSA Block Grant requirements, and will allow us to combine the seven regional prevention plans into a composite state prevention plan. As in the past, Benchmark will use the Regional Prevention Plans as a guide while making funding decisions.

Target Populations are the types of people whose attitudes, knowledge, skills, risk/protective factors, and behaviors who could benefit from substance abuse prevention programs or initiatives.

Risk Factors are attributes or conditions individual, families, schools or communities that increase the likelihood of substance use/abuse problems.

Risk Factors	Priority

Examples: Early initiation, favorable attitudes, low perception of harm or wrongness of use, friends who engage in problem behaviors, alienation or rebelliousness, etc.

Examples: Favorable parental attitudes or involvement with ATOD, family management, family history of use, family conflict or violence, etc.

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Protective Factors are attributes or conditions that buffer an individual from the influence of risk factors or reduce the likelihood of use.

Examples: Disapproval of substance use, gender issues, positive future outlook, plans for college or skilled trade, resilient temperament, positive social orientation, etc.
